Course Overview

This course seeks to complement your rigorous technical preparation with topics relevant to your educational and professional development. We will look at how to prepare for job searching, interviewing, and employment; career advice; and basic business skills. ME 490 guides students through the process of tailoring their college experience to suit their individual career goals. Students will complete their own personalized career and professional development plans and will even consider their personal finances and retirement planning. Professional ethics, business communication, and entrepreneurship will also be discussed. This course seeks to foster life-long learning by cultivating students' capacity for reflective practice—the examination of our own experiences and their relationship to our ever-expanding knowledge base.

Essential Questions

Every day of college brings new opportunities, lessons, and challenges. The time goes by quickly and there is a lot that needs to get done. How can we make most of this experience? What should we do to prepare for an exciting and rewarding future while also leaving time to enjoy the college years?

This course will ask you to think through how you might make the most of the nearly endless opportunities at Penn State.

Grading

You grade will be determined as follows:

- 35% for Class Attendance and Participation
- 30% for Weekly Module Assignments
- 35% for Lifelong Learning Assignment

In ME 490 it is always better to turn something in late as opposed to skipping it completely. Late submissions only lose 10% per day down to 50%. Once an assignment is five days late it will not drop below a 50% late penalty.

Letter grades will be assigned based on the standard 94% (A), 90 (A-), 87 (B+), 84 (B), 80 (B-), 77 (C+), 70 (C), 60 (D) cutoff scheme. There is no dropping of grades and no extra credit. However, the penalty for late work is small.

Assignment Due Date/Time

Weekly assignments are to be submitted by Tuesday at 11:59 pm Eastern Time each week in the appropriate Canvas assignment.

One thing that you need to know: a grade of zero is automatically applied to missing submissions once the due date is passed. However, late work is accepted at a modest penalty of 10% per day. After five days, the late deduction freezes at 50%. In ME 490, you are better off turning in your assignment late rather than skipping it completely.
